Kirton Primary School Celebrates Being Ranked Amongst the Top Schools in the Country - for the Fifth Year Running!

Following a busy two terms leading up to Christmas, full of productions, performances, church services, class trips, visitors, sporting fixtures, shows, Enterprise Week, a children's entertainer, a visit from Santa and choir performances (pew!), we find ourselves with another, equally busy timetable for the next two terms - and we cannot wait to get started!



Kirton Primary School has learned that the progress made by our children in last summer's SATs tests for reading, writing and maths has, once again, put us amongst the best performing schools in the whole country.

We are delighted to share our most recent national assessment results.



In our Foundation Stage (reception classes), we achieved the highest results in over 5 years. Well done to all the staff and children involved.

In our Y1 phonics screening, 87% of our children achieved at or above the expected level, compared to 82% nationally and 81% for the Local Authority.

Our KS1 results (Y2), were also the highest we have had in a number of years at 65%, which is in line with the national average and above the local average which is 61.5%.

Our KS2 results (Y6), continue to show our children progress at well above the national average rate, and progress scores continue to place us amongst the top schools in the country.



If you check the DfE's Primary School League Tables for the county, you will see that our school topped the league tables for the most progress made in writing and maths in Lincolnshire (out of 329 primary schools and academies), and made the third most progress in reading.



In fact, out of 20 533 primary schools in England, Kirton Primary School made the second most progress in writing and 34th most progress in maths. What an amazing achievement - and such a fabulous start on the education journey for our children!

Important Reminder: This year's assessments for Y6 children take place on the week beginning **11th May 2020**. If your child is in Y6, please ensure that they

are in school for the whole of this week as these important results travel with them to their secondary schools.

Kirton Primary School is also proud to announce that it has been awarded the Basic Skills Quality Mark. This Quality


Mark is an internationally acknowledged accreditation, supporting and recognising improving standards in the provision, practice and performance of English and mathematics.

Collectively, the children in these three year groups have already read 10,764,126 words in their reading books - which equates to 2275 books read since September!

This is an amazing testament to our children's love of books.

Road Safety



Concerns have been raised recently by one of our bus drivers who is worried that some parents are not using the correct road crossings outside the school. Please take the time to model road safety to your children. We remind children regularly about road safety, and urge them not to take short cuts across the carpark or bus park at the beginning and end of the day. We ask parents and carers to support us in this by modelling safe practice.

Keeping Safe Before and After School



Although our school day begins at 8:55, we open our doors at 8:45 as we are a large school and this aids congestion and allows are children to enter the building safely and calmly.
This means that staff are committed to ensuring children's safety inside the building and are not simultaneously able to patrol the playgrounds. We rely on parents

and carers to take responsibility for their children before and after the school day. Please insist that your children use the paths, and avoid taking shortcuts across the carpark and bus park.
Please ensure your children dismount bikes and scooters at the school gate and do not allow them to ride these once on the school site.
Children's safety is everyone's responsibility.
As the evenings are darker, we recommend that children wear reflective materials over their coats.

Safeguarding children is everyone's responsibility. Please check out a most recent information in the section labelled 'Parents' on our website.

Admission to Reception in September - Act Now!

Places are filling up quickly in our Reception classes for September 2020. To join our Reception cohort, a child's date of birth must fall between 1.9.15 and 31.8.16. Please note, we do not administer our own admissions to Reception; applications must be submitted to Lincolnshire County Council who allocate places on our behalf. You may apply online at www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/schooladmissions or make a telephone application by contacting the Education Team on 01522 782030. The closing date to secure a place is **Wednesday 15th January 2020**.

We accept children from the surrounding area, not just Kirton village. There is no guarantee that children who have attended our Nursery, or who have siblings already in school, will be allocated a place at Kirton Primary School, so it is important to get your application in early. If you know anyone who has a child who would like to start with us in September, please let them know the importance of completing the online forms as soon as possible. Kirton Primary is a very popular school and many of our year groups are already full. Don't miss out!

Ofsted said of our Reception classes:

The early years classes are inspiring and safe places to learn. Teachers provide a range of stimulating activities to support children's learning across different areas of the curriculum.

Children's reading, writing and mathematics skills are developed well in the early years. Teachers plan frequent opportunities to develop these skills through stimulating learning activities.

Good teaching and care enable children to make good progress.

Admission to Nursery

Places are already filling quickly for September in our award-winning Nursery. If your child's date of birth falls between 1.9.16 and 31.8.17, and you would like a place, please let our office staff know. We will take your name and address, and forward details on how to apply.



Remember, every child is entitled to 15 hours a week at our Nursery **completely free**. This can be taken in the morning, in the afternoon or all day as long as we have enough places available. Afternoon places are often easier to secure than morning places which are regularly oversubscribed. As well as the 15 free hours a week, to which all three-year-olds are entitled, we offer additional sessions over and above this as well as increased flexibility when selecting sessions for your child. You may choose mornings, afternoon, or a mix of both, including full days - or even 5 full days a week. We will do our best to accommodate your request.

Additional sessions, above the free entitlement of 15 hours, may be purchased at a cost of £12 for 3 hours. This is extremely competitive locally. Eligible working parents may be entitled to **30 free hours** for their child. Lunch is also available if required.

If you know anyone else who might benefit from our excellent Nursery facilities, please let them know.

Remember, we are also the only local provider with **fully qualified teachers**.

Ofsted said of our Nursery:

Children in the Nursery Year settle quickly and make a good start to their school life. Staff build effective relationships with parents to meet children's learning and care needs well. Relationships between adults and children throughout the early years are nurturing and positive. Seven-Aside Football Team



Kirton Primary School has finished 2nd in this event three years in a row and 2019 was due to be even tougher with 5 more schools competing.

Tag Rugby

Football Team



Other Safety Reminders



Our official school start time is 8.55. However, in order to settle children ready for lessons and to stagger the children coming into school, we open our doors from 8.45. Please note that there is no supervision of children on the school grounds in the morning as we supervise them in school from 8.45 instead (we do not have the capacity to do both). In the interests of health and safety, children must not arrive unaccompanied before 8.45. Our classroom doors close at 8.55, and, should you arrive after this time, you must bring your child around to the office to sign them in. Arrival after 8.55 will be recorded as late and will be on your child's file.

In the interests of safeguarding, we are required to report unattended children on

our grounds so it is important that children do not arrive early and unaccompanied.

If you have changed your address or telephone number recently, please ensure that you have let the office staff know. We must be able to contact you in case of an emergency. Also, ensure that the school has at least one emergency telephone contact, in addition to your own, in case we are unable to contact you. Remember that this number may also need updating.

Please contact the school **early on the morning of the first day** of your child's absence. A lot of office time is lost chasing up absent children, which we do to ensure that they are safe. You will appreciate that we would prefer to direct our resources to supporting our children in the classroom.

We might be required to call the police to carry out a 'safe and well' check if you have not informed us that your child will not be in school and we are unable to contact you. This can be distressing for parents and children, and we are keen to avoid this situation.

Thank you in advance.



Please remember, in the interest of keeping children safe, no images of children may be taken on the school site without the express permission of the Executive Headteacher or the Head of School.

Any images you have permission to take must not be posted on social media sites or

shared publicly. We also do not allow visitors to use mobile 'phones inside the building.

These safeguarding measures ensure that we may be sensible about allowing parents and family members to take photos and videos of their children at events such as Sports Day and Christmas productions, which we understand is important and are keen to continue.

If your child brings a phone to school, please remind them to hand it in the office in the morning. They may collect it at the end of the day, but no phones are allowed in school.



Children should not come to school with 'smart watches' or any other devices capable of taking images or sending/receiving messages. This is to ensure the safety and privacy of other members of the school community.



Some of our children risk suffering a life-threatening reaction to nuts - even by simply being in the vicinity of a nut. For this reason, we ask that no child bring any

food items into school that contain nuts, even for their own consumption.

How You Can Help Your Child at Home

The best place to discover what your child will be learning in the upcoming term is the year group newsletter. These newsletters come out six times a year. They contain ideas about how to continue learning at home. Teachers are always only too happy to let you know how best to support your child should you have specific enquiries. They are also always happy to discuss your child's progress - you do not have to wait until parents' evening. The end of the school day is the best time to talk to staff. We recommend that you make an appointment through the school office to guarantee that your child's teacher is available.

New Multiplication Tables Test for all Y4 pupils


$$2 \times 2 = 4$$

The Government has announced that all children in Y4 are to have their multiplication skills formally tested, beginning in June 2020. This means that our current Y4 cohort will be amongst the first children in the country to take part in this assessment.

If you have any questions or concerns about this, please discuss them with your child's class teacher.

Support your Child's Learning

Multiplication Tables: One of the challenges of the national curriculum is that every child should know their tables up to 12 X 12 by the end of Y4. We have a Tables Challenge in school and we teach tables regularly in class, but learning tables is matter of constant repetition so, whenever you get a moment, please practise with or test your child. As an incentive, every set of full marks in your child's weekly tables test earns them another Kirt to save in the bank or spend in the shop.

We are keen for our children to know their tables, but wish the learning of them to be as much fun as possible. To this end, our website contains useful resources to support your child's learning at home. These may be found in the 'Parents' section under 'Support Your Child's Learning', as well as in the 'Children's' section.

You will find a tables' grid and some practice sheets to download should you wish to use them with your child. You will also find songs and videos made by our staff and children that you might sing along to.

Spelling: From Y2 to Y6, your child will bring home a set of 10 weekly spellings to learn. These may include words that support the spelling rules your child is learning in class, commonly misspelt words, or useful words recommended by the National Curriculum.

If you want to take a look at the National Curriculum spelling vocabulary for Key Stage 2, it is on our website. They're not as easy as you might think!

Remember, we are running a Spelling Championship in school with a top prize of 100 Kirts to spend at Kirton Stores, and every set of full marks in your child's weekly spelling test earns them another Kirt.



Last Term's Winners

Handwriting: We use a cursive script across the school in order to improve handwriting and presentation. Lower down the school, this may result in a more 'untidy' style at first as children get to grips with the joins. However, with perseverance, your child's handwriting will improve. Visitors often praise our children's amazing handwriting skills.

The Myth of 'The Head Lice Letter'

Occasionally, parents request that a 'head lice letter' be sent when they believe there has been an 'outbreak'. However, unlike in smaller village schools, in a school of over 500 children, it would be safe to say that a number of children will have head lice on any given day. Younger children, in particular, often put their heads together when playing, and may pass lice on to their friends and/or siblings. This can lead to the impression of an 'outbreak'.

On the advice of healthcare professionals, the school does not send out a letter every time lice are detected - such a letter on a daily basis would soon lose its impact.

We have also been advised that to send a letter advising on head lice would be to give the false impression that there is a particular problem at a particular time when in fact it only appears that way to the small group of families who are dealing with the issue. It is, therefore, preferable

that all parents and carers be vigilant at all times.

On the advice of healthcare professionals, we hold 'Bug Busting' days on a regular basis instead.

Bug Busting

Every school has to deal with head lice, and we are no exception. Although we will never eradicate head lice, there are things that we can do to alleviate the problem. This **Saturday, 11th January**, we ask that every child's hair is checked at home for lice.

The following advice comes from the healthcare professionals:

A fine tooth plastic comb is best for detecting head lice and you should check school children and family members at least once a week. Young lice are the size of a full stop and adults the size of a sesame seed. Treatments are available from your GP and are **free** for children. You should only treat those people with lice living in their hair.

A Message from our School Lunch Suppliers



Willoughby Foods (suppliers of our school lunches) is delighted to announce that they have recently received the School Food

Standards Compliant Award from Lincolnshire County Council. This means that their menus have been checked and approved by the Food Education Team at Lincolnshire County Council to ensure our children are enjoying healthy, tasty and nutritious school meals which are compliant with the School Food Standards.
